There is no one form of education; children learn in many different ways.

You do not have to complete any of the forms. The forms are optional and intended to be of help to you. Your home education will not necessarily follow a set timetable, but most parents find that keeping some records is very helpful.

The records can take any form. We have included some blank copies you could fill out if you wish and some examples for you to look at.

To help you provide a suitable education programme for your child(ren), we have included a range of resources that could be used to support learning. There is no requirement to use these. It is up to you, as the educating parents, to decide what best supports your child's education.

Keeping a record of learning can be a helpful revision tool for your child(ren). Looking back on learning supports children in their education progress, helping them know and remember more.

### Resources

Children learn in many different ways. Resources can be used to develop learning/ gather information and then apply it. Learning is successful when it is applied, e.g. using maths knowledge to calculate the cost of a family outing. Resources can take a range of forms as listed below:

- Text books- To gather information
- Exercise books To apply learning
- Computer research To gather information
- Interactive activities on the internet To gather and apply learning
- Library study To gather information
- Educational applications on tablets To gather and apply learning
- Practical equipment
- Visits and outings To gather and apply learning
- TV and radio programs To gather information

It can be beneficial to use a range of these resources to engage the learner effectively.

These are only suggested resources that you could use for your child's education. This is not a comprehensive list and they are not endorsed by Solihull Council. It is up to you to decide the suitability of them for your child's age, ability and aptitude as stated in the DfE guidance. A wide range of other resources are available. Some will require a payment and others are free.

If you enter a website and click on links, you must be wary of any malicious content and computer viruses that you could get as a result of clicking on them.

It is vitally important for you as the educating parent to check the safety of online resources (including links accessed here) and to teach your children about e-safety so they are able to keep themselves safe online.
